After I graduated from college, I was hired by Fulton County Schools in Georgia to teach physics. So on August 1st, my parents and I packed up all of my belongings (maybe three boxes of items and a couch) and traveled together to Georgia to move onto the next phase of life. While it was an exciting adventure for me, it was not so much for my parents. In fact, I remember my father saying, “You raise your kids to be independent, and when they become independent, you don’t want them to leave”. I really didn’t think much about that statement until recent years.

As a parent myself, my children are moving to the age of independence. While we want them to be on their own and care for themselves, there is still a feeling of worry about their decisions that they will be making on their own. However, we know it is the right step, and it is the natural way of things. Hopefully, my children have become resilient enough to handle the challenges as they are released into the world.

In a PreK-12 school, we have the wonderful opportunity to see many of our students grow from the first day of PreK or Kindergarten, until graduation. When students enter school in the primary grades, at first they need explicit guidance by an adult and as they get older they are progressively released towards independence.

In addition to the person quality characteristics of trustworthiness, respect, responsibility, fairness, caring and citizenship, the quality of RESILIENCE is so important in every individual. While the first qualities refer to ethical values, resilience refers to the ability to accomplish tasks, even when failure happens.

If you have ever tried anything hard and failed, and then tried again, you have the quality of resilience. Resilience leads to determination, determination leads to effort, and effort leads to accomplishment. I encourage my own children to try something new, failure will only teach you what not to do, which gets you closer to your goal. I’m not always good at it, but if my children could see that they may not be able to do something “yet” then they still have the hope and thus motivation to continue the challenge.

I believe that we have an obligation as a school, to challenge our students to do the same. Try something new, step out, build resilience. At no other time in your life are there the support mechanisms available for individuals than during their years of school. Now is the time to take the leap to try something new!

A few FFA officers visited various agribusinesses in November and participated in some outdoor leadership development activities at Camp Oswegatchie.



STUDENT COURSE SELECTION MEETINGS FOR NEXT YEAR.....

Mr. Barrett, high school counselor, has begun meeting individually with students in grades tenth and eleventh to set up next year's course schedules. To initiate the process, all of next year's high school students will have the electives outlined to them for the next school year in their classes. Soon after that, student will have individual appointments. Parents are encouraged to be closely involved in this process. At a minimum, parents should take some time to discuss the course of their child's education with them. This should include courses chosen, educational goals and performance levels. Mrs. Monnat, school counselor for Grades 6-9, invites parents of eighth and ninth grade students to call and make an appointment to join their child during his/her course selection meeting. Course selection involves learning about coursework required for graduation and selecting electives for the upcoming high school year that are relevant to future career aspirations. Parent involvement is a productive part of selecting the right coursework for each student.

Sixth and Seventh grade students also participate in individual meetings with Mrs. Monnat, wherein they discuss the required coursework for the upcoming year. These sessions also become an integral part of tracking student interests in specific career pathways, and guiding conversation about related required academic preparation.

All middle school parents are encouraged to call with questions or concerns at any time. BOCES INFORMATIONAL PROGRAM AND VISITATION FOR SOPHOMORES

Teachers from the Howard G. Sackett Technical Center in Glenfield (BOCES) will be presenting an assembly in early December to introduce sophomores to the variety of programs available to them next year. In the beginning of January, sophomores will have then have the opportunity to visit BOCES for a few hours to observe two programs that they may be interested in signing up for next year. The BOCES programs available to students include Auto Body, Automotive Technology, Building Projects, Carpentry, Cosmetology, Criminal Justice, Culinary Arts, Early Childhood Education, Electrical Wiring, Environmental Conservation and Forestry, Gas & Diesel Mechanics, Integrated Production and Design, Medical Careers, Veterinary Practices, Visual Communications and Heavy Equipment. During the counselor-student meetings in the spring, these students will have an opportunity to sign up for one of these programs for the following two years. Students should consider this opportunity carefully as it is a *two-year* time commitment.

Attention 17 and 19 year-old Male Students



If you are not registered with Selective Service, you must do so within 30 days of turning 18 years old. You **must** register. This is not a school requirement, it is the law. If you fail to register, it will affect your ability to receive Federal College Loans and Grants, and also student aid in most states. In addition, it will affect your ability to receive job training or to gain citizenship if you are a male immigrant seeking U.S. Citizenship. It will even curtail your opportunities to get many good jobs in the future. Go on-line at www.sss.gov or fill out a registration card at any U.S. Post Office. See Mr. Barrett if you have any questions.

AN IMPORTANT NOTICE FOR JUNIORS

A year from now most of you will be preparing application forms for college. With the multitude of colleges to choose from, the process of exploring your options can be interesting and fun but also confusing and very time consuming. This is why NOW--THE JUNIOR YEAR--is the time to seek out information and identify the types of schools you'd be interested in. Mr. Barrett will be working with you throughout the year to provide a variety of ways you can obtain the information you need. If you or your parents have questions about the college selection process, you are encouraged to see or call Mr. Barrett.

ACT/SAT SCHEDULE

The Scholastic Aptitude Test and American College Test are national examinations that are used for college admissions. SAT's are no longer required by most colleges. However, they can be helpful for competitive programs. See Mr. Barrett to discuss whether taking the SAT will be helpful for you or your student. Please see your counselor for additional information.

STUDENTS TAKE ASVAB TESTS

High school students that were interested in taking the ASVAB had the opportunity on November 14 at Beaver River. The ASVAB consisted of eight short tests which covered the areas of General Science, Arithmetic Reasoning, Word Knowledge, Paragraph Comprehension, Auto and Shop Information, Mathematics Knowledge, Mechanical Comprehension, and Electronics. As a result of taking these tests the students receive information on themselves (such as interests and abilities), information on the world of work, and ideas relating to specific careers they may be well-suited for. This test is no longer just for military-bound students. The ASVAB does an excellent job matching a student's academic strengths and general interests with both civilian and military careers. All juniors were encouraged to take this free assessment. If you are interested in taking this test in the future, please reach out to Mr. Barrett.

SENIORS TO COMPLETE COLLEGE APPLICATIONS

It is the time of year when seniors need to get serious about organizing their college applications. This is especially so for those looking to apply for "early decision" consideration.



This process can either be very time consuming or relatively simple depending on the particular college. SUNY college application forms can be quite basic and students may even use one form to apply to multiple colleges. Four-year college applications often require more of the students such as essays and teacher recommendations.

The recommended application deadline for SUNY colleges is **December 1**. Although SUNY will accept applications after this date, adhering to this deadline can make a difference in acceptance to competitive programs. It also may make a difference in securing available housing on some campuses. The application deadlines of private college vary (approximately December through late spring). It is each student's responsibility to contact the colleges he or she is considering to find out their deadlines.

College applications should be completed carefully and thoroughly, with the awareness that students are giving admissions personnel the first impression of themselves. Attention to detail is exceptionally important. Most applications can be done on-line. Please see Mr. Barrett **before** applications are submitted. *Please be aware that some colleges do not have an application fee if you apply directly to the college. For instance, if you apply directly to Jefferson Community College there is no fee, but if you apply through the SUNY Application Processing Center, there is a hefty fee.*

All applications that are not submitted online (and corresponding fees) are to be submitted to the Guidance Office where they will be checked for accuracy and forwarded to the colleges with copies of their high school transcript. Students who are applying to colleges online are also to notify the Guidance Office so that copies of their transcript will be mailed to the appropriate schools. This information was explained by Mr. Barrett to the seniors in their English classes. Students and parents are invited to contact Mr. Barrett if they have questions about this process.

MORE INFORMATION FOR COLLEGE BOUND SENIORS.....

- Students should be continuing to look through college catalogs and websites, meet with college representatives in the Guidance Office, have on campus admission interviews and attend college open houses!
- Students should make sure they have taken all tests (SAT 1, ACT, etc.) that are required by the colleges to which they are applying to! They should also ensure that their scores are forwarded to each college.
- Searching for scholarships is a lot like exploring colleges, the more you put into it, the more you are likely to get out of it! Application deadlines for various scholarships occur throughout the senior year. How to search for scholarships will be explained to students in their English classes.
- If you have questions about the college exploration process, please contact Mr. Barrett.

ALSO.....

When you receive your letter of acceptance from colleges, please bring it to the Guidance Office so we may make a copy of it. Most colleges expect you to make a decision about where you will attend by May 1. You will likely need to send them a deposit as a guarantee of your commitment. Please be sure to follow the directions in your acceptance letter carefully

SCHOLARSHIP AND FINANCIAL AID INFORMATION

SCHOLARSHIP INFORMATION:

Monthly packets listing scholarship information are available in each seniors English class. The listing of the scholarships will also be available to seniors through Google Classroom and parents signed up to Parent Square, as well. Feel free to call the Guidance Office with questions.

FINANCIAL AID INFORMATION:

- College Bound Seniors: If you plan on applying for federal or state financial aid, you will want to fill out and send in your FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid) form shortly after December 1. This must be done online at www.studentaid.gov
- To do your financial aid, you must get your FSA I.D. Do it now at fsaid.ed.gov as soon as possible. Your parents and you will both want one.
- BEWARE of ANY web sites that charge money for filling out the FAFSA. This process should be free. The best help and advice that can be found concerning college financial aide is also free. It is generously offered from college financial aid offices because it is in their best interest to help students pay their bills.
- If you have any questions, feel free to contact Mr. Barrett in the Guidance Office or your college's financial aid office.

MIDDLE SCHOOL NEWS

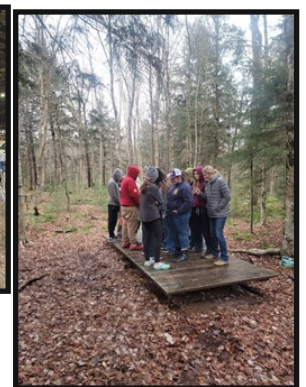

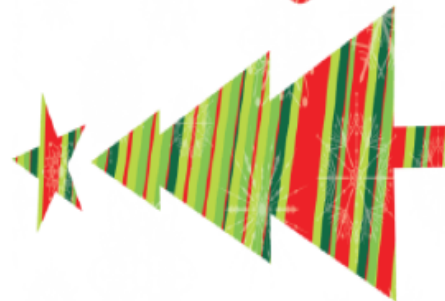
